



SIGNIFICANCE AND BELIEFS


At the heart of Maha Kumbh Mela lies the belief in spiritual cleansing and divine connection. Devotees believe that taking a holy dip in the sacred rivers during this auspicious occasion washes away sins and fulfills their spiritual aspirations. The event symbolizes unity, devotion, and the eternal cycle of life and death.



HISTORY & LEGEND

The ancient tale unfolds as the demons, advised by Vasuki, the origin of Kumbh Asura, reside on Earth to obtain immortality. Under the guidance of Brahma, the gods and demons join forces to churn the milky ocean, using the Mandara Mountain as the churning rod and the serpent Vasuki as the rope. Amidst the celestial churning known as Samudramanthan, the elixir of immortality, or Amrita, emerges. The demons, for twelve days and nights, relentlessly chase the gods for possession of this divine elixir. In commemoration of this celestial event, the Kumbh Mela is celebrated every twelve years at four sacred places—Allahabad, Haridwar, Ujjain, and Nasik—where drops of the elixir are believed to have fallen. This extraordinary festival brings together humans and gods alike, marking a spiritual journey at the holiest of waters. Join in the sacred celebration at the Maha Kumbh Mela, where the echoes of this ancient pursuit of immortality resonate across the ages.





The Kumbh Mela occurs cyclically at four main locations—Prayagraj, Haridwar, Nashik, and Ujjain. The timing is determined by an astrological alignment, making each Kumbh a unique and spiritually charged experience. Devotees flock to different rivers on different dates to partake in this sacred journey.




KUMBH MELA RECCURANCE
